Cozy Comfort



THE GIVING TREE GRAFTON PUBLIC SCHOOL

In past years, St. Andrew's has put together Christmas hampers with foodstuffs, toys and other gifts for families in need in our community. These families are identified by our liaison at Grafton Public School.

In 2023, due to time and volunteer constraints, it was decided to give gift cards for food and gifts rather than hampers. The gift cards really worked well. They allowed families to purchase clothing in the correct sizes and colours and toys that the children had specifically asked Santa for. The families appreciated the gift cards to grocery stores because they could choose the foods they liked for the Christmas season. Due to this positive response, we decided to continue to provide gift cards again this year.

In 2023, our Social Justice and Outreach Committee supported 3 families. This year, 5 families were identified by our liaison at the school. Based on family size, we gave grocery cards of \$300-400 to each family and gift cards from Walmart of \$100 per family member. Our total expenditure was \$4,100. Although that amount was not entirely derived from cookie sales, a good portion of it was due to the success of our Heavenly Helpings Cookie Factory.

Here's the response from our liaison at the school: "No words could clearly express how grateful we are for this incredible generosity! Your team has truly made this holiday season bright for our families. Thank you so very much." The principal also thanked us: "Thank you Olivia! Please pass on our thanks to your whole team."

I personally wish to thank our "team" of bakers who produce the delicious cookies that we sell. Let's keep baking throughout 2025 so we can make the holiday season bright for needy families again next Christmas.
